There is a promise in the first reading this Sunday that God will not 'grow weary of Jerusalem'



or people. You know how we grow weary of some people after a while. You might feel these days with someone else or with the world. God never reaches that point with you.

t says that 'you shall be called 'My Delight'. Our hearts will beat a little faster when someone whispers such words in our ear. That is what prayer is about when our hearts suddenly hear a whisper of love that 'you are no longer to be called Forsaken or your land the Abandoned'. God is with you.

The gospel of the wedding feast of Cana is very familiar. There are beautiful lines there too. Mary turns to the stewards and says to them, 'do whatever he tells you'. It's as if Mary whispers in their ear like ours. This weekend, we might be weary, but we are in the right place, listening to the right person in Jesus Christ. Mary's word to us is the same as in the gospel, 'do whatever he tells you'.

The end of the gospel reading is powerful too. It says that 'he let his glory be seen and his disciples believed in him. Imagine, the weather might be miserable, we are in difficult times and someone whispers in our ear that we are not forsaken. We take heart this weekend and look to the future assured in the loving words of Jesus and Mary.


CHRISTMAS DUES

The theme of "epiphany" continues with the Wedding Feast of Cana. The story is extraordinarily rich in biblical resonance and Gospel echos. In the YouTube video, the quantity has been converted to litres... "about 100 litres" per jar. To be only slightly more precise, three or four measures would be somewhere between 75 and 115 litres. In any case, a lot! Abundance rather than precision is what matters, in this highly symbolic story.

The miracle story corresponds in some way to the foundational scene in Mark 1:14-15. To use a musical metaphor, John modulates Mark into different keys, bringing out themes important to him: love, joy and celebration. A good place to start on the synodal pathways!

- 2. The wine symbolises true joy in believing— a bit of a challenge these days, but central nevertheless and even lifegiving. Where do you find your springs of joy?
- 3. "Do whatever he tells you" is a strong invitation to conformity to Christ on the path of discipleship. What have been the important points on that path? And where am I now?

God of wonders, at Cana in Galilee, you revealed your glory in Jesus Christ and summoned all humanity to life in him. Show to your people gathered on this day your transforming power and give us a foretaste of the wine you keep for the age to come.
