Message for the Day for Life – June 16 2024

"The Lord is my Shepherd – Compassion and Hope at the End of Life"

There has been much discussion in the media recently about "assisted suicide", whereby people who feel they are overburdened by suffering will be facilitated in bringing their lives to a premature end by a change in legislation. The Catholic Church opposes such proposals. As Catholics, along with many people of other faiths and none, we share a different vision about what it is to be fully human, especially when we are suffering and approaching death in the hope of eternal life. People who are coming towards the end of their lives are vulnerable, and recent research shows that many feel themselves a burden on their loved ones and wider society. Jesus shows us that life always has dignity and that there is no such a thing as a useless life. We are called to defend this gift of life to its natural end and to protect vulnerable citizens from a culture that could pressure them into assisted suicide. We support people with the companionship of a listening ear, appropriate treatment, and the best of care, so that their last days can be times of grace, intimacy and love.

A brief introduction on Sunday's readings

First reading **Ezekiel 17:22-24**

Any gardeners among you will enjoy this reading because it evokes botanical imagery. What's the prophet trying to say? Well, he was writing during and after a catastrophic collapse, a collapse of both religion and politics. But here his message is one of hope, hope built on faith in God.

Second reading 2 Corinthians 5:6-10

When he wrote this, St Paul was no longer a young man and aware of the fragility of life. But he remains young in the Spirit and is still full of faith and longing.

Gospel Mark 4:26-34

The botanical metaphors continue in our Gospel. Both parables speak of planting and growing, but each one has its own message: the mystery of growth and the miracle of hospitality. It is all truly the gift of God perhaps something we need to keep in mind today?

Observations

Trees are indeed a source of wonder in themselves. When you think about the roots, the trunk and the bark, the branches and the twigs, and finally the fruit and the leaves! Trees seem to know when the next part should develop and there is a beautiful proportion in trees. For any one fascinated by numbers in nature, trees follow the Fibonacci sequence, 0-1-1-2-3-5 etc., beginning in the growth of the trunk and then spiralling outward as the tree gets larger and taller. Trees have even evolved using the same Fibonacci sequence to track the sun moving in the sky and to collect the most sunlight even in the densest forest. No wonder the symbol in the Bible of knowledge of good and evil is a tree. They do seem to know something!

And no wonder the Bible speaks so much about trees. No wonder Jesus — a true countryman at heart — spoke so appealing of trees, as in today's Gospel reading.

Reflections

- 1. If you sow seeds, or watch plants grow, you have ample opportunities to pause in wonder at the whole process of growth. It takes place imperceptibly and comes to fruition in beautiful flowers, majestic trees and abundant harvests.
- 2. Jesus uses this as a parable about the growth of the Kingdom of God, thekingdom of right relationships with God and with one another. There too growth is slow, development is imperceptible, and then without realising it you have a mature relationship. Recall the stages of such development in your life and relationships, and give thanks.
- 3. In the second parable Jesus invites us to reflect on the importance and significance of relationships in our lives as they grow and mature. This is true both of our relationship with God and with others around us. When have you found a relationship in which you could "make nests in its shade"?

PRAYER

O God, at whose bidding the seed will sprout and the shoot grow towards full stature, hear the prayer of your assembled people. Make us trust in your hidden ways, that we may pray with confidence and wait for your kingdom now growing in our midst.

We make our prayer through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. Amen.

Thought for the day


