Reflections

It is challenging to go against the status quo and do something different. This can be too much for some. Lord, may we not be defined by the dictates of this world but have



the courage to live our lives as followers of Jesus. Many people are limited by their human thinking. Jesus revealed another reality, one that is divine, transcendent and which requires faith. We pray for openness to the deeper mysteries and the surprising ways God works in our lives and in the world.

'Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?'The crowd let their prejudices get the better of them: assuming they knew everything about Jesus they had a good excuse not to take his words seriously. We pray for the ability to realise where my prejudices lie. We ask for an open heart and mind. *I am the living bread that came down from heaven.* Whoever eats of this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh.' Another huge claim by Jesus about himself: We stay with these words, asking for understanding, for faith in the great gift we are being offered in the Eucharist.

The last occurrence (17:2) teaches that eternal life is a quality of relationship which begins now in the present moment and which is indestructible (Heb 7:16). Prayer

POINTERS FOR PRAYER

- 1. Jesus gave the disciples a share in his Faith is reasonable but we cannot reason our way into faith. We have to be 'drawn by the Father'. We have to be 'taught by God'. What opens your mind and heart to God's message?
- 2. One thing which closes our minds to what another is saying is when we label them disparagingly, as the Jews did to Jesus. Have you ever had the experience of being surprised by the wisdom of another when you laid aside your prejudices about her/him to listen to what s/ he was saying?
- 3. 'No one has ever seen the Father except the one who is from God'. As Jesus put a human face on God and God's love, so God's love for us today is mediated through one another. How have other people been sacraments of God's love for you?
- 4. The way in which Jesus became a source of life for us was by giving himself. It is when we truly give ourselves that we can be life-giving to one another. If we do not give of ourselves, what do we have to offer? How have you discovered the importance of self-giving, in yourself or in others?

PRAYER

God our Father and provider, whose Son has given his flesh for the life of the world, sustain your pilgrim Church on its journey with the word of life and the bread of heaven. Draw us nearer to him in whose name we gather, that, following his way of sacrificial love, we may come to the banquet of eternal life. Grant this through your Son, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Observations

I am the bread of life

The Fourth Gospel was written about the end of the first century. Already by then there were some people taking part in the Eucharist, without an adequate grasp of who Jesus is and what happened for us in his death and resurrection. Into that concrete situation, the evangelist shaped his writing in order to challenge and enrich.

The writer "takes on" the situation in two ways. In chapter 13, he takes the radical step of removing the story of the Lord's Supper with the bread and wine and replaces it with the washing of feet. In this way, he shows that the Eucharist is supposed to have an effect on how we live...

Earlier, in chapter 6, while the Eucharist is certainly in view, each story "lands" on a teaching about the identity of Jesus. Again, he teaches that the Eucharist presupposes a deep faith in Jesus, the word made flesh, the saviour of the world. Without such faith and without such consequences, our taking part in Eucharist would make little sense. The two issues faced by the evangelist have never really gone away...
