Anyone or any family who has experienced the heartache of losing a child during pregnancy or at birth, no matter how long ago that loss may have occurred, are welcome to join us in remembering your precious child and honouring them in ritual and in prayer.

Observations

In the month of October, we were praying for the Synod in Rome, which closed on the last Sunday of October. On the four Sundays of the Synod, we had a special Opening Prayer as well as prayers of the faithful. Here in Dublin, a one-page newsletter was distributed in parishes and churches to keep people informed and to raise our awareness of what was going on. In other words, an effort was put in to keep us all abreast of what is happening.

We can ask a blunt question: what was this all about, was it worthwhile and will it make any difference? The Final Document proposes a series of changes which, if implemented, will change radically how we are as a community of faith. I'll pick out three as a kind of taster. Firstly, all present agreed that the question of women in the diaconate is "open". It is not enough but it is certainly in the right directly. Secondly, all present called for a church marked by participation, transparency and evaluation. All we do should be regularly evaluated — it even mentions explicitly evaluating the ministry of bishops. Thirdly, it calls for changes in canon law so that gatherings such as parish councils are no longer merely consultative but have genuine authority. It might sound like an internal churchy thing but in reality it a step against the closed culture of clericalism. Again, if properly implemented, these are in their perhaps understated way quite revolutionary proposals and a worthy continuation of the reforms of the Second Vatican Council.

Reflections

- 1. The scribes are presented as ostentatious and devious, acting more out of self-interest than the love of God or people. There can be a element of self-interest in each of us. Perhaps there have been times when you have been disturbed by glimpsing in yourself other motives' in your doing good. Recall when you were awakened to this fact. Where was the good news for you in these experiences? 2. In material terms what the widow had to offer was very little. Recall when you felt yourself called to give and gave even though you apparently had very little. Perhaps you have had the experience of finding that what you thought was little and insignificant meant a great deal to another person. Recall some of those moments.
- 3. The widow 'gave everything she had, all she had to live on' In doing so she placed herself in a very vulnerable position, trusting that things would work out. Have you ever found that what seemed a generous but reckless giving of yourself proved life-giving for yourself and others? **PRAYER**

God, our provider you are the orphan's hope and the widow's bread. Strengthen our faith, that with simplicity of heart we may come to trust in you alone and hold back nothing in serving you.
