A brief introduction on Sunday's readings

First reading Isaiah 62:1-5

How can we talk about God? Our human experience of love provide the basis in experience for talking about God as love.

Corinthians 12:4-11 Second reading

Today, we start reading from 1 Corinthians, beginning with chapter 12. Paul uses the image of the physical body to meditate on the gifts in the Christian community.

Gospel John 2:1-11

This reading calls for special attention. Even if we read it literally, the meaning is at another level, because the writing is contrasting the mother religion, Judaism, and the offspring, Christianity.

The Jubilee Year 2025 - a Holy Year of Hope

This year on Christmas Eve, 2024, Pope Francis, like Pope John Paul II in 1999, opened the Holy Door to begin a Jubilee Year in 2025. It will be an ordinary holy year — in accordance with the tradition of the Church to celebrate such a year every 25 years, to give every generation a chance to experience that special time of grace and mercy in their life. Those who participate in a Holy Year pilgrimage are granted a plenary indulgence; those who are unable to attend in person for concrete reasons are invited to participate spiritually, "offering up the sufferings of their daily lives, and participating in the Eucharistic celebration."

Year of Prayer, Listening and Discernment

Family of Parish Gatherings – Next Steps: Over the next four months all the Parishes and Families of Parishes of our Diocese will be involved in the next stage of our Year of Prayer, Listening and Discernment. This will involve representatives of each Parish Leadership Team participating in 3 meetings over 3 weeks reflecting on the questions posed in Bishop Fintan's invitation in September. Since September, people individually and in Parishes, have been praying the Diocesan Prayer from the Boat. As we continue to pray this prayer together, we pray for the success of these gatherings and we pray that the Holy Spirit will guide us as together we try to pray, listen, and discern God's future for our Church.

Observations

The **Wedding feast at Cana**, found only in John's Gospel, is presented as the first action in the life of Jesus, again, only in the fourth Gospel. It is a wedding celebration, so it is marked by love, joy and abundance. As can be seen from the first reading, it picks up the marriage symbolism of the Old Testament. Across the Old Testament, the metaphor of marriage is used to describe God's relationship with the people of Israel — a relationship of love and faithfulness, joy and fruitfulness. In the remarkable words of the first reading,

As the bridegroom rejoices in his bride, So will your God rejoice in you.

In these days when we struggle to believe in God at all, perhaps we do not often think of God rejoicing in us!

Reflections

- 1. The marriage imagery puts all the emphasis on love, an emphasis found richly in this Gospel, in St Paul and, of course, in Jesus' own teaching. Go back to signicant experiences of being loved and how these have opened your own heart to receive and to give in love.
- 2. The wine symbolises true joy in believing—a bit of a challenge these days, but central nevertheless and even lifegiving. Where do you nd your springs of joy?
- 3. "Do whatever he tells you" is a strong invitation to conformity to Christ on the path of discipleship. What have been the important points on that path? And where am I now?

PRAYER

God of wonders, at Cana in Galilee, you revealed your glory in Jesus Christ and summoned all humanity to life in him. Show to your people gathered on this day your transforming power and give us a foretaste of the wine you keep for the age to come. Amen.
